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BRAINBUSTERS TAKE PORTSMOUTH MEET

Sweeping the Portsmouth meet last Sunday, Brainbusters topped the field in a style reminiscent of the recent Richmond coup. In establishing a probable new National Record and capturing all first places in addition to a number of others, Brainbusters continue to display their leadership and ability with each rassing date on the Contest Calendar.

Official confirmation from AMA Headquarters of a new Senior Freeflight Gas record is expected shortly in recognition of Bruce Alwood's outstanding performance. Placing first in Class "A" with an average time of 11 minutes and 45 seconds. Bruce turned in the longat official flight of the day with ver 30 minutes out of sight being registered on his last of three attempts. Considering that a ten second maximum engine run was in effect during the meet, the record is even more remarkable since AMA rules permit twenty seconds to be used for record scoring.

VICTORY VISITS SEATTLE PLANT

An interview with John F. Victory, executive secretary of the NACA, who was in Seattle recently on an inspection trip, appeared in the July 11 issue of "The Seattl. Times."

Victory was in Seattle to inspect projects under way and on the drawing boards at Boeing Aircraft Company, many of them still on the Army's secret list, according to the article.

The article, in part, follows:

"' We are on the threshold of a
new era of high-speed flight, made
possible by new means of propulsionjet, and even something beyond that,
rockets and nuclear energy,' Victory declared.

"Victory said the NACA is concentrating on problems of supersonic flight--faster than the speed of sound at approximately 700 miles an hour.

"The visiting official said two problems confront aviation engineers in outlining ships for supersonic flight-designing a plane with stability and control for supersonic speeds, and designing a craft of novel shape, capable of low speeds as well, for take-offs and landings.

"Victory said the supersonic plane of the future will be enormously stronger, lighter and smaller than conventional propeller-driven aircraft.



INVEST SPARE CASH IN SAVINGS BONDS

Late figures from the Payroll Office show that during the present Savings Bond Campaign that twenty-seven employees have increased their allotments and thirty-four new participants have subscribed.

Prior to the campaign, 1,132 employees were subscribing to savings bonds making the payroll deduction \$19,286.33 per payday. The new participants and increases bring the net increase to \$543.29 with a total deduction of \$19,829.72.

This total is still far short of the Laboratory's goal of 10% or more subscription of the gross salary by at least 90% of the employees.

Laboratory employees are urged to invest their spare cash in the systematic purchase of United Stated Savings Bonds through the Payroll Savings Plan. The attendance clerks in each section have been provided with bond allotment cards for the convenience of employees.
