ANNOUNCE ADULT EDUCATION COURSES

A new course in mechanical drawing with sections on blueprint reading and sheetmetal pattern drafting will be started soon at Hampton High School under the Vocational and Adult Education program. Charles E. Nagy, Engineering Section, will be the instructor for this combined group. Individual and group instruction will be given to persons enrolled in each type of training. The course will run for a period of 40 hours and will be in session for 2 hours each on Mondays and Thursdays beginning at 7 p.m. The number of persons to be enrolled in the group will be limited to approximately 20.

A new group of high school mathematics courses are scheduled to start next week. Registrations are being taken for elementary algebra, advanced algebra, plane geometry, and trigonometry. These classes meet on Mondays and Thursdays from 7 to 9 p.m. and are scheduled to run for a term of 40 hours. Mrs. Marguerite Stevens, of the Hampton High School faculty, and Robert L. Girouard, Planning Office, will be included in the teaching staff.

The ground school course for pilots is also in the process of organization. This course will include a review of civil air regulations, meteorology, aerial navigation, and general service of aircraft, and will be taught by Donald C. Cheatham, Flight Research. The class will meet on Monday and Thursday evenings from 7 to 9 and the length of the course has been set for 40 hours. The course is tentatively scheduled to start on February 3.

As was pointed out last week, the Laboratory will be able to hit the \$1,000 mark with an average contribution of approximately 30 cents.

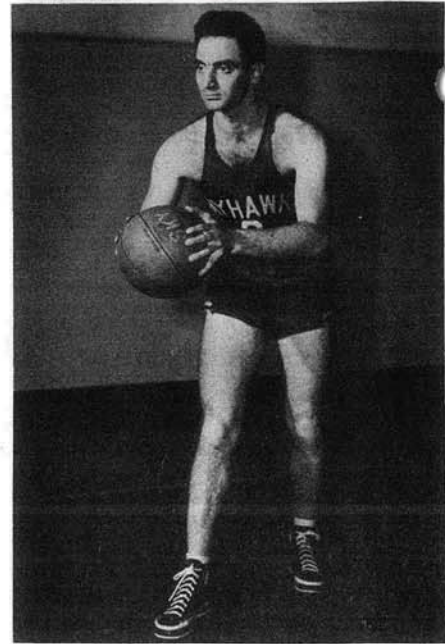
REDMON NAMED STAGE MANAGER
