NNINGTON SPEAKS TO ENGINEERS CLUB

EMPLOYEE WORKS ON PROJECT IN ALASKA

After spending the summer in Orlando, Florida as NACA representative on the joint Thunderstorm Project, Jack Funk of the Aircraft Loads Division will now spend several midwinter weeks in Alaska working on radar evaluation with American Airlines.

The 'hunderstorm Project is a joint research project of the Weather Bureau, Army, Navy and NACA. It has as its aim the complete measurement and better understanding of thunderstorms with an ultimate view toward improved safety of flight. The Aircraft Loads Division, long a leading group in the investigation of atmospheric turbulence and gust loads on sirplane structures and which had previously initiated and carried out a smaller thunderstorm investigation at Langley Field in 1941 and 1942, conducted the flight measurements of turbulence and draft circulations in the joint project at Orlando. This project will be continued in 1947 in Ohio where thunderstorms of different types will be investigated.

The American Airlines radar evaluation project is being performed under contract with the Navy Bureau of Ships. Agein, the Aircraft Loads Division is participating because of the turbulence aspects of the investigation.
