THIRD TERM OF APPRENTICE SCHOOL BEGINS JANUARY 7, 1946

It has been announced that the third five-week term of the Apprentice school will begin January 7. These classes will be taught as usual from 7 'til 9:30 p.m. on Monday and Wednesday nights at the Hampton High School. The Training Unit wishes to emphasize again that while the courses are intended primarily for apprentices and prospective apprentices, any interested employee of the Laboratory may take advantage of such training provided a nominal fee of \$1.75 is paid for each 25 hour course.

The tentative list of courses to be offered includes the following: Blueprint Reading, Shop Mathematics, Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry, Logarithms and Slide Rule, Physics, Mechanical Drawing, Mechanics and Strength of Materials, Machine Shop Theory, Sheetmetal Layout, Metallurgy, Use of Handbooks, Simple Aeronautics, and Advanced Aeronautics. In addition to these courses, others may be offered provided there is a sufficient registration to warrant the offering of such courses.
