

# DIES SUDDENLY

Ernest J. Shave, who retired from the Laboratory March 31, 1949 after  $26\frac{1}{2}$  years of service, died suddenly Sunday night at his home at 220 Manteo Avenue.

Born March 31, 1887 in Oneonta, New York, Shave was educated in the "school of hard knocks". He started at the early age of fourteen as an apprentice in the old George Westinghouse Electric Manufacturing Plant at Schenectady, N.Y. and completed his apprenticeship in 1905.

He came to the Peninsula in 1918 and after serving three years in the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company he entered on duty at the Laboratory and was a ssigned to the Machine Shop. After serving a number of years at the Laboratory, Shave was appointed superintendent of the East Machine

# HOLD ARTIFICIAL RESPIRATION CLASS

A class in artiticial respiration was conducted this week for approximately 40 Laboratory employees who have duties which might necessitate the use of this procedure.

Instruction was supervised by George Perry, Field Safety Director for the Hampton Chapter of the American Red Cross and Chief of the Buckroe Fire Department. Perry has been associated with first aid and fire fighting work for several decades. He was assisted by Captain Robert Snow, who is in charge of the Phoebus Fire Department's ambulance and first aid equipment, and Thomas Dorsey, Jr., engineer with the Hampton Fire Department.

Laboratory employees who aided in instructing were Paige Burbank, Curtis Burt, Jr., Raymond Selby, and A. A. Schmidt who are associated with local fire departments

and Red Cross work.

The first session was held in the Projection Room of the administration building. Two movies were shown depicting proper methods of applying the Shafer Prone Presure Method of artificial respiration and elements of first aid, followed by a demonstration of the Laboratory's Inhalator which is available for use 24 hours a day in the foyer of the West Area Heating Plant.

# BLOODMOBILE WILL VISIT LAB DEC. 22

The Red Cross Bloodmobile will make its first visit to the Laboratory on December 22, operating from 9:30 a.m. to 3:15 p.m. at the Activities Building.

Approximately 290 employees have thus far submitted registration slips signifying their willingness to donate blood. Appointment cards for the December 22 date are being sent out by the Health Unit.

It is planned to collect 100 or more pints of blood during the visit to NACA. The blood will be returned to the blood center at Norfolk where it will be processed and distributed to local hospitals and physicians for use. There is no charge made to the patient for the blood used from the blood center, the only cost being service charges by the hospital and the physician's fee.

The Gray Ladies and aides of the Elizabeth City County Red Cross Chapter will serve refreshments to the donors following drawing of the blood, and will assist with clerical procedure. Each donor will receive a card recording the donation and bearing a permanent number and also will be furnished with an attractive lapel pin to identify him as a participant in the program.

## BASE AIR POLICE ASK COOPERATION

There have been some recent instances of failure on the part of a few NACA employees to respond to instructions given by Air Police at such strategic locations as intersections on the Base and at the Dodd Boulevard traffic circle.

Shop. Following an illness of several months he was transferred to Personnel Division and was working with the Civil Service Board of Examiners at the time of his retirement.

In 1936 he organized and headed the IMAL Federal Credit Union and served as president of the organization from August 1946 until his retirement. Following his retirement, he was a candidate for the Virginia House of Delegates.

Shave served as secretarytreasurer of the Virginia State Federation of Labor for eighteen years and as president of the Central Labor Union at Hampton for 25 years. He was a member of the Elks lodge and St. John's Episcopal Church.

He is survived by his wife, the former Miss Nora L. Lawson of Hampton.
