#### HINTS ON KEEPING Rest rooms clean

The Laboratory is making a concerted effort to maintain satisfactory appearing sanitary facilities. The following are a few ways in which the employees may show consideration for those who are trying to keep these facilities clean:

Keep hands off painted surfaces. If there are handles or push-plates on doors, be careful to use them.

Throw paper towels and tissues in trash cans, not on floor.

Where lockers are provided, keep personal effects in them in neat order. Do not scatter personal effects on top of lockers, tables, towel cabinets, or glass shelves.

Do not keep food or eating utensils in lavatories.

In using powdered soap, be careful not to drop it on floor or plumbing fixtures beneath basins.

### "JOAN OF LORRAINE" IS PLAY WITHIN A PLAY

"Joan of Lorraine", the Hampton Little Theatre's forthcoming production, is a play within a play. The action takes place during a rehearsal of Joan of Arc. Scenes from the play itself and interludes of discussion among the actors are skillfully alternated so that the threads of the parallel plots are unbroken.

The story of the play within a play is history. Joan, a simple country girl, has visions which tell her of the great things she must do. Following the guidance of these visions, she sets out to free France. She finds she must battle not only the English, but evil and treacherous forces within France itself. Despite these obstacles she becomes commander of the armies, relieves the siege of Orleans, and crowns the Dauphin. Finally, however, she is captured by her enemies and imprisoned and told she must renounce her beliefs or be burned at the stake. She reaches her ultimate decision in one of the play's most stirring scenes.

# ANNOUNCE EXAM FOR ENGINEERS AND SCIENTISTS

The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced a civil service examination for Aeronautical Research Scientist, P-2 to P-8, \$3397 to \$9975 per annum. This examination is for probational appointment to positions in the three Laboratories and Washington Headquarters of the NACA. The NACA Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners has announced an examination for Engineers, P-2 to P-5, \$3397 to \$5905 per annum. This examination is for probational appointment to positions at this Laboratory.

Applications will be accepted until further notice; however, persons interested in being considered for positions which are to be filled immediately should have their applications on file not later than May 1.

The Aeronautical Research Scientist examination is for scientists interested in research with training in Engineering, Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, and Naval Architecture. The Engineer examination is for engineers engaged in design and other technical services. If in doubt as to which examination should be applied for, it is suggested that applications be filed for both.
