RED CROSS DRIVE SHORT OF GOAL

A total of \$2,382 had been collected as of March 16 in the Laboratory's annual American Red Cross campaign, leaving more than \$1,100 yet to be contributed by staff members in order to reach the goal of \$3,500.

The drive closes Monday and the 67 volunteer solicitors throughout the Lab will make a last-minute effort today and Monday to bridge the gap. Only 1,463 employees have contributed thus far, representing 44 per cent of the Laboratory staff. This means that of the 3,310 Lab employees, 1,847 have not yet contributed.

The volunteer solicitors have been making a commendable effort to contact every employee in order to give each staff member an opportunity to contribute. Any employee desiring to make a donation and who has been missed in the solicitation is requested to notify the East Dispensary, telephone 2243, and a solicitor will be dispatched to contact him.

The following are the collections thus far by areas: West Area (North), Janie L. Burroughs, chairman, \$713.96 contributed by 385 employees, the average being \$1.85; West Area (South), Barbara J. Durling, chairman, \$604.85 contributed by 457 employees, average contribution \$1.32; Administrative Area, Lucy W. Bainbridge, chairman, \$571.10 contributed by 339 employees, average contribution \$1.68; Full Scale Area, Helen N. Foley, chairman, \$492.10 contributed by 282 employees, average contribution \$1.75.

Another 100 per cent group reported to the area chairman by the volunteer solicitors is Stability Analysis, located in West Area (North). This brings the number of 100 percenters to six, the other five being Planning Office, Budget Office, Aircraft Loads Division Office, Stability Research Division Office, and West Computers.

The NACA Skyhawks closed their season last Saturday with a game against Bill's Barbecue in the AAU Tournament in Richmond. In the tournament game the Hawks took an early 19-15 lead but were trailing 33-26 at halftime. During the fourth quarter the Hawks pulled ahead 48-46 but were unable to stop the opponent's last minute rally and went down 65-58. High point men for the losers were Luchuk, Thompson, and Merten with 18, 17, and 11 points respectively. Leading the winners was P. Gentry, All Southern high school star from John Marshall, with 17 points.

Statistics show that the Skyhawks have had a very good season with a total of 19 wins and 10 losses. Bennett and Bates were next in line with an average of 5.9 and 5.3, respectively.
