# COLLECT \$3,064 FOR RED CROSS

A total of \$3,064.88 has been collected in the Red Cross drive here as of Wednesday morning, with the Administrative Area contributing \$841; Full Scale Area, \$749.03; West Area (North), \$740.84; and West Area (South), \$734.01. Efforts will be made to close the campaign next week and employees wishing to make contributions are requested to contact the solicitor for their group. Through last Friday, there were 1,636 contributions averaging \$1.83 each. Two thirds of all employees contacted made contributions. Less than ten per cent of the employees remain to be contacted and the solicitors hope to complete the job next week.
