

111 EMPLOYEES ELIGIBLE FOR SERVICE AWARD

Laboratory officials pointed out this week that approximately lll employees are eligible for the NACA Meritorious Service Emblem and plans are being made to present the emblems to the group during the first part of August.

According to the record, 104 male and 7 female employees are eligible for the service emblems. Pobert E. Mixson, Chief, General Services Division, is the Laboratory's oldest employee in point of service and he will be eligible for the 30 year pin on August 11. The fifteen year pin will be presented to 42 employees, the 20 year pin to 46, and 23 employees are eligible for the 25 year pin.

The gold-filled, emblematic pins have the basic wing design of the NACA insignia and are embossed

ACTIVITIES BUILDING OPEN SUNDAY AFTERNOON


Laboratory employees are reminded that starting Sunday the Activities Building will be open every Sunday Afternoon from 1 until 5.

X_RAY SURVEY STARTS AUG. 2

Preparations are being made by the Laboratory's Health Unit in cooperation with the State Department of Health for the 1949 chest X-ray survey of Lab employees. Dates for the 1949 survey have been scheduled and preliminary work for the program is underway. The scheduled dates are August 2-5 and August 8-10.

It is planned to use the same locations as in the 1948 survey with employees in the East Area being served in the East Area Dispensary located in the Utility Building and the West Area employees being X-rayed in the lounge room of the Activities Building.

As has been customary for the past few years, there will be no charge for this service and disrobing will be unnecessary. Although participation in the X-ray
survey is entirely voluntary, it
is strongly recommended that each
employee avail himself of the opportunity of obtaining this valuable diagnostic service. For the




