McCONNELL GETS 16 AS IRD WINS LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP

With big Jim McConnell pacing the attack, IRD walked off with the men's basketball league championship Monday night at the YMCA, turning back the 8-Foot High Speeders, 35-25.

McConnell, held scoreless for the entire first half, suddenly came to life and pumped in 16 points. His teammate Frank Liberatore added 10. Luke Liccini topped the losers with eight.

IRD got off to an early lead, having the best of a 7-4 count at the quarter mark. In a listless second quarter, 8-Foot got four points, held IRD scoreless, and led at halftime, 11-10.

At the beginning of the second half, McConnell dropped in two quick baskets and Liberatore one to take a five point lead. Beiduk narrowed the count two points but the IRD circus was off again

with McConnell and Taylor leading the way. Each connected for two from the floor and Mac added a foul shot. Beiduk hit on a layup and Liccini added a free throw and the three-quarter score was IRD 25, 8'HST 16.

Things got more interesting in the last stanza with IRD making 10 points to 8-Foot's nine. Final score, IRD 35, 8'HST 25.

COMMITTEE SAYS "GIVE 'EM RAISE"

A 17 percent across the board increase and the establishment of two additional scientific and engineering grades at \$12,000 and \$14,000 were recommended last week by the Jackson subcommittee of the Civil Service Committee of the House of Representatives.

These recommendations along with several others will be made to the House committee where it is anticipated they will receive little or no opposition.

The Senate has already passed a bill calling for an approximate 11 percent increase.

In addition to the provisions already mentioned, double pay for holiday work and the extension of the 10 percent night differential to include the sixth and seventh working days were asked.






