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### HOWARD REACHES 25 YEAR MARK

Celebrating his twenty-fifth year of service with the NACA is Francis J. "Stumpy" Howard, Instrument Construction.

Born November 12, 1900 in Malden, Massachusetts, "Stumpy" entered the Newport News Shipyard Apprentice School in 1917. After graduation in 1922 he spent the following year at the Augusta Military Academy. On June 9, 1924 he entered on duty at the Laboratory as a machinist and has worked in the Machine Shop, Power Plant, Engine Research Section, and Instrument Construction.

When old-timers at the Laboratory get together for a chat, the conversation invariably reverts to the old NACA baseball team, which played some of the best amateur nines in Tidewater Virginia before finally disbanding in the late Twenties. In order to keep the opponents confused, the team usually switched from a left handed pitcher to a right handed one. "Stumpy" and "Lefty" Forrest, Transportation, took turns serving on the mound for the team with Percy Keffer, Mechanical Maintenance, completing the battery.

One of the big days in "Stumpy's" life came on February 23, 1925 when he deserted the bachelor ranks to marry Mary Alma Gardiner of Southern Maryland. They are the proud parents of two daughters.

# DECALS REPLACE NACA IDENTIFICATION TAGS

It has been announced by Laboratory officials that new NACA
automobile decalcomanias will be
issued to replace the present metal
NACA identification tags. It has
been decided to use decals instead
of the metal tags for identification and security purpose and also
because the application of the metal tags to license plates in a
uniform location is becoming more
and more difficult.

The application of these decals to the windshield has been approved by the Department of State Police, Commonwealth of Virginia, and must be placed thereon in accordance with their instructions. The State Police request that the decal be placed in the blind spot immediately behind the rear-view mirror on the side farthest away from the driver. Application of these decals at any place other than as directed may be considered a violation of State Traffic Regulations.

These decals must be used on all employees' cars which have a rear-view mirror on the windshield. For vehicles which do not have a rear-view mirror on the windshield, the present NACA automobile identification tags shall be used.

The new decal will be distributed to employees in their respective sections and all NACA automobile tags which are replaced by NACA decals must be returned to the Property Office by August 1.
