FST STOCKROOM CLOSES TODAY


Effective at the close of work today, the Full Scale Tunnel Stock-room will be closed permanently. Stock supplies will be issued from the Warehouse in West Area.

OPEN EXAM FOR APPRENTICE

The NACA Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners has announced an examination for probational appointment to the position of Apprentice, First Year, \$1705 per annum. Apprentices will be appointed in the following trades and applicants will have opportunity to express trade preference at the time of appointment: Aircraft Mechanic, Electrician, Electronic Mechanic, Machinist, Model Maker, Sheetmetal Worker. Upon completion of three years of apprenticeship in some of the above trades, certain apprentices who have shown the required aptitude and ability will be afforded opportunity to receive an additional two years of training and complete apprenticeship in one of the following occupations: Metal Model Maker, Engineering Draftsman, Instrument Maker, and Aircraft Metalsmith.


