FORMER EMPLOYEE DIES IN EXPLOSION

Mrs. Dorothy Zaruba Batzold, bettsr known to her friends here as "Cookie", was one of several persons killed July 29 in an explosion which wrecked a Harrisonburg beauty shop.

Mrs. Batzold came to work at the Laboratory as a messenger in January, 1945, resigning a year later. After the death of her husband, Bertram Batzold, who was employed in the West Sheetmetal Shop, she returned to work in August 1946 as a mimeograph operator.

About six months ago Mrs.
Batzold resigned to return to her home in Waynesboro. She indicated to fellow employees here that she intended to study to be a beautician and news dispatches from Harrisonburg indicated that she was a student at the beauty parlor where the explosion occurred.

Born in Prince George County on May 12, 1927, she made her home at 208 Hampton Avenue, Hampton, during the latter part of her residence on the Peninsula.
