

## BRAINBUSTERS ALSO RECORD BUSTERS

As a result of Brainbuster Model Club Activities during 1946, three world records have come to the Peninsula. Officially approved last week by the AMA, the records represent three distinct fields of model design and flying techniques.

On July 29 Bob Stewart boosted the Class "B" open outdoor glider record to 11 minutes and 40 seconds. Joe Boyle climaxed the postwar series of indoor meets by surpassing the old mark three times to establish a new high of 60 seconds. The same day Ray Williams flew a Class IV controliner at a speed of 89.96 miles per hour.

Indications are that Brainbusters will continue the pace through 1947 as evidenced by steady club activities during the normally slack months of winter weather. Postponement of last week's scheduled speed meet, due to high winds, will enable a larger field to compete this Sunday.
