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NACA GOLFERS WILL PLAY ON JULY 20, 21

Plans have been made to hold the First Annual NACA Golf Championship Tournament at the Hampton Country Club on Saturday and Sunday, July 20 and 21. A 36-hole, medal play, handicap tournament will be played with 18 holes scheduled on each day. Trophies will be awarded in low gross and low net brackets.

The tournament is open to any male employee of the Laboratory. The entry fee is three dollars, which includes green fees. Entrants will be required to furnish their last five scores, on which the handicap will be determined. Closing date for all entries is Friday, July 12. FORMER EMPLOYEE DIES AFTER ILLNESS

Rufus Bunyon Penny, formerly of Instrument Service Section, died at his home at 321 Chapel Street, after a long illness. He was born in South Port, North Caroline on September 13, 1887.

Known as "Judge" Penny to all who worked with him, he came to the NACA on November 1, 1922 and after 23 years of service requested retirement because of failing health on April 21, 1945. At the time of his retirement he was one of the Committee's oldest employees in point of service.

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TRAFFIC PROBLEM BEING LICKED

One of the most heartening feelings that anybody working or living on Langley Field has had in the past few weeks has come when he was driving on the base in the morning or off in the afternoon without having to go through the stop, weit, and go traffic that had been flowing regularly for years. Thanks to Provost Marshal Major Ivan B. Snell an intelligent method of routing traffic as speedily as possible has made life easier for the hundreds of drivers using the main gate.

Major Snell would like to have his thanks expressed to the Laboratory employees who are taking advantage of his system, and who by getting into the swing of things quickly are assisting greatly in the elimination of the former problem.

He has offered a few pointers, which if followed, should make things even smoother and a bit safer. They are:

(1) When coming on the base in two lines, continue two lines to the circle and don't try to crowd into one at the end of the bridge.

(2) Follow all directions of the MP's or guards, but make certain the directions are aimed at you, not the car in front or in back.

(3) If two lanes are being run and the bridge is clear, cross over immediately into the clear lane and then stay there. Don't crisscross.

(4) When coming off the base, Shellbank and West Area traffic should generally keep in the right lane and Dodd Bouleverd traffic in the left.

(5) On leaving the main gate, drivers in right lane must realize that cars in the left lane must cross over. Make room for them. Reach 35 mph speed as soon as possible on highway and hold to it.

BURROWS HURLS TWO SHUTOUTS; 8-FOOT STILL IN LEAGUE LEAD


