

PLAN SMOKER FOR APRIL 13

Officials of the Activities Association announce that plans are underway to hold a Smoker on Wednesday, April 13 at 8 p.m. at the Activities Building. Guest speaker for the occasion will be Abe Silverstein, former head of the Langley Full Scale Tunnel now Chief of the Wind Tunnel and Flight Division at Lewis Laboratory.

Silverstein, who was chosen to deliver the Wright Erothers Lecture before the Institute of Aeronautical Sciences on December 17 in Washington, will deliver the same lecture on "Research on Aircraft Propulsion Systems" at the smoker. His paper summarizes the research goals and the status of research efforts in the aircraft propulsion field.

Silverstein transferred from the Langley Laboratory in 1945 and was appointed Wind Tunnel and Flight chief at the Lewis Laboratory. He has the responsibility of directing research in the Altitude Wind Tunnel, Icing Research Tunnel, the Supersonic Wind Tunnels, and in flight. He has been with the NACA since his graduation with a B.S. in mechanical engineering from Rose Polytechnic Institute in Terre Haute, Indiana in 1929. In 1934 he received an M.E. degree from the same school.

E. J. SHAVE RETIRES FROM LABORATORY

Yesterday was pay day, retirement day, and birthday for Ernest J. Shave, Personnel Division.
Shave, who was born 62 years ago in Oneonta, New York, has retired from the Laboratory after 262-years of service.

Educated in the "school of

hard knocks", Shave started at the early age of fourteen to serve his apprenticeship in the old George Westinghouse Electric Manufacturing Plant at Schenectady, N.Y. and completed it in 1905.

He came to the Peninsula in 1918 and worked for the Newport News Shipyard and Dry Dock Company before entering on duty at the Laboratory's Machine Shop on October 30, 1921. In 1919 Dan Cupid won out and Shave settled down with a local girl.

After a number of years at the Laboratory Shave was appointed superintendent of the East Machine Shop. Following an illness
