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FOURTH TERM OF APPRENTICE. SCHOOL OPENS FEBRUARY 18

The fourth term of apprentice classes will begin February 18, and as usual, classes will be taught at the Nampton High School on Monday and Wednesday nights from 7 until 9:30 p.m.

While the courses are intended primarily for apprentices and prospective apprentices, any interested employee of the Laboratory may take advantage of such training, provided a nominal fee of \$1.75 is paid for each 25 hour course. L/B NECEIVES INFORMATION FOR PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERS

Several engineers have inquired about the Virginia law which governs the certification of professional engineers. Langley recently received, through official channels, a copy of the application for Certificate to Practice Professional Engineering: major examination subjects, covering mechanical engineering, structural engineering, highway engineering, electrical engineering, and industrial engineering: and a legal summary which covers reciprocal certification and registration of professional engineers.

A fee of \$25 must accompany the application for Virginia certification to practice professional engineering. The examination covers two full days.

GOVERNMENT EMPLOYMENT QUING BACK TO PEACETINE PASIS

In a move which has been eagerly awaited since the end of hostilities last August, President Truman on Tuesday ordered the Civil Service Commission to reconvert the Government's personnel plan to peacetime practices immediately. The Commission got right on the ball and announced new regulations governing Government employment.

The Executive order put a halt to hiring persons under war service regulations and allowed only temporary appointments until applicants who have passed competitive examinations can be certified from the list of eligibles to the agencies.

All current war service appointees who wish to hold their jobs will be giver opportunities to take the examinations. Those who pass the exam will be certifield to the Lab for permanent status appointments as soon as their names are reached on the list of eligibles. Eligibles will be listed in the usual way, the highest grade first. Disabled veterans will receive an additional ten points and be placed at the top of the register and non-disabled veter as five points in addition to the grade they make on the examination. Those who fail the exams will be subject to replacement.

As part of the new regulations, it was announced that committees of examiner may be set up in the departments and agencies to hold examinations in the scientific, professional, and technical fields for positions which are peculiar to one agency or group of agencies,

PELLILE T THUMAN AGAIN ASKS PAY INCHLASE

President Trumen, last londay, pointed out to Congress the need of higher pay for government employees. He stated that adjustments were necessary to commensate for loss of overtime earnings and to meet living costs. He also expressed the view that such adjustment would promote efficiency and economy.

The President Went on to say about pay increases: "The elimination last autumn of overtime work for nearly all Federal employees meant a sharp cut in their incomes. For salaried vorkers, the blow was softened but by no means offset by the increased rates of pay which had become effective July 1. Further adjustments to compensate ior increased living costs are required. Poreover, we have long needed a general upward revision of Federal government. salary scales at all levels - in all branches - legislative, judi ial, and executive. Too many in government have had to sacrifice too much in economical advantages to serve the nation.

"Adequate salaries will result in economics and improved efficiency in the conduct of government business, gains that will far out-weigh the immediate costs. I hope that Congress will expect action on salary legislation for all Federal employees in all branches of the government."

Current war service appointees with at least one year's Government service who bass the examination but whose names are not reached on the list of eligibles will be given regular appointments at the resomencation of the department or agency where they work, provided that the lowest r ting reached on the list does not exceed their rating by more than five points and provided that all 10-point veterans ahead of him have been given consideration according to the Veterans' Preference act of 1944.

Laboratory officials stated that as soon as additional information regarding the reconversion is received it will be forwarded immediately to the staff.

Personnel officer T. Melvin Butler urged that employees keep their heads and not be frightened by newspaper accounts which envision mass termination of war service appointees. Butler said, "Iny war service appointee who has done. his job well should be thoroughly qualified by his experience, training, and other cualific tio s so that he will attain a high enough place on the list of eligibles.
