BOTH CAFETERIAS QUIT BETWEEN MEALS SERVICE

The NACA "xchange Council announces that beginning on Monday, January 21, the Laboratory cafeterias will be open for business at regular meal times only. The cafeterias were originally authorized to provide meals as required at regular times; however, during the war, the hours were extended because the cafeterias were called upon to serve a larger number of people due to the increase in staff and overlapping of shifts., "he situation has changed now, and it is believed that, the needs of Laboratory employees can be taken care of sufficiently during the regular meal hours.

The East Area Cafeteria will serve breakfast from 7 to 8:10 a.m.; lunch from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.; and supper from 4:45 to 6 p.m. The West Area Cafeteria will be open for business during the same breakfast and lunch hours but will not serve supper. Employees are reminded to buy cigarettes and in-between snacks during regular meal hours as these items will not be on sale at any other time.

CONF APE THE PAYS

Last Sunday night when the last scheduled run of the Peninsula's "rolling showcases" pulled into the car barn, little did the residents of the area know how significant it was. The worn old bell gave its last "clang" and the tired old whistle gave its last absurd "p cop". Street cars were no more. The heads of the transportation company decided that the time had come.

Upon our interview with "old 636" on Monday, we found that the cars themselves are glad for the rest. Speaking as spokesman for Local 213, International Confederation of Worn Out Electric Railway Cars, "old 636" said, "Our lot has not been a happy one. We have stood the abuse of the public too long. We rose to a position of true greatness in this section, then fell away until we were but a ghost of our former selves. I am glad the ghost has given us up."

What this venerable veteran referred to was the real heyday of streetcar transportation. Started on the Peninsula in the 1880's, they hit their peak in the early '20's. At one time the car lines extended to such points as Old Point Steamer Dock, Newport News Ferry Dock, Hilton, Langley Field, Buckroe Beach via East Hampton, railroad stations in Newport News and Hampton, and along the Boulevard.
