## LAB EMPLOYEE DIES FROM FALL

Sanford James Couls̉on, Instrument Service Section, died as the result of a fall down a flight of stairs in the Activities Building about 1.: 30 last Saturday night while attending a section party.

Coulson, who had been on infantile paralysis victim since he was five years of age and was able to walk. only with crutches, was born April 6, 1909 in Woodlawn, Virginia. He came to work for the $\mathrm{N}: \mathrm{C}$ s in Spetember, 1943.

According to reports, no persons witnessed the accident but Coulson was found unconscious at the foot of a set of cement stairs. Rushed to the Base Hospital, he was prounced dead at 11:50 p.m.

Dr. Paul J. Parker, coroner of Elizabeth City County, who investigated, gave a verdict of accidental death. He said that Coulson, being a cripple, probably made a misstep and fell down the stairs.
