She confides this knowledge to David, Claudia's husband, but they refrain from telling Claudia, lest they destroy the completely happy state in which she exists.

A great comfort throughout the play are the hired couple, Fritz and Bertha, who seem to know instinctively what to do to be most helpful. Although they have their own personal troubles. they always appear cheerful, because, in Fritz's words, "Here





"AIR SCOOP" CELEBRATES FIFTH ANNIVERSARY



This week marks the fifth anniversary of the langley Latoratory's weekly publication, the first issue being distributed to employees on November 30, 1942, as the "LMAL Bulletin". After about six months of operation, during which it was published spasmodically, it was put on a weekly basis and has missed very few issues since that time. The publication was re-christened as the "Air Scoop" with the issue of December 1, 1944, and has retained the name up to the present time. The primary aim of the "Scoop" is to bring the employees closer together by publicizing their activities and interests and passing along certain official messages designed to keep the staff informed. Since several readers have expressed an interest in the process the "Scoop" goes through before it is ready for distribu-

tion, some of the story is told in pictures shown on this page. After the makeup sheets are completed in the editor's office, they are turned over to Mechanical Reproduction for processing and printing. First stop is the copy camera room (top photos) where photographic negatives are made of the makeup sheets. Then they go to the composition table (center left) for splicing and assembling and for the elimination of pencil markings and other imperfections by opaquing. Next, the assembled negatives are printed on a sensitized metal plate by exposure to light (center right). After the plate is developed (lower left), it is mounted on an offset press (lower right) and printed. The completed "Scoop" is then folded, counted, and distributed to the employees.
