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PRIMARY ELECTION SLATED FOR TODAY

The primary election for the district representatives to the General Assembly of the IMAL Morale Activities Association will be held today and the final election is slated for Tuesday, November 5. Election supervisors will be responsible for the election in their districts.

Polls for the nominating election will be open today from 7 a.m. to 4:15 p.m. and the voter is given an opportunity to nominate any two candidates within his district. The ballot will be secret.

From the tabulated list, the three names receiving the highest number of nominating votes will be andidates for the final election a Tuesday. The voter may select only one of the three names nominated. The person receiving the most votes becomes the representative of his district, and the next two the alternates according to the number of votes each polled.


