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ANNOUNCE BIENNIAL SPRING DANCE INSPECTION PLANS

The NACA's 1949 biennial inspection, which will be attended by more than 1,000 invited guests from all parts of the United States will be held at the Laboratory on May 18, 20, 23 and 24, according to an announcement by Dr. H. J. E. Reid, director.

May 18 and 24 are the dates scheduled for different contingents of top government officials, aircraft manufacturers, aeronautical research experts, and other civi-lians concerned with the advancements made during the past year in the Laboratory's research program.

Military service representatives will attend the inspection May 20, followed May 23 by a group of invited guests from educational institutions interested in aeronautical research and from local military installations.

Dr. Reid pointed out that the purpose of the inspection is to acquaint the experts in the field of aviation science with some of the advancements made by the Government's research agency during the past year and to give the visitors the opportunity of viewing some of the equipment which made the progress possible.

Approximately 12 Laboratory facilities will be visited by the guests, who will also hear brief lectures and witness demonstrations at each stop. Some of the lectures and demonstrations will concern work done at the Ames Aeronautical Laboratory at Moffett Field, California, as well as at Langley.

The inspections were formerly held at the Laboratory each year, with the exception of the war years. when the gatherings were discontinued for security reasons. The last one held here was in 1947, which was the 16th to be conducted at Langley. Now they are held on alternate years at the Langley Laboratory and at Ames, Moffett Field, California. Ames was host at an inspection last May.
