

EMPLOYEES MAY OBTAIN PERMANENT STATUS

Under the President's Executive Order #10080, any person who has been continuously employed by the Federal Government since March 15, 1942, and occupied a competitive position on September 30, 1949 may, upon recommendation by his agency and after qualifying in such non-competitive examination as the Civil Service Commission may perscribe, acquire a permanent Civil Service appointment.

Leave withour pay for any purpose for a period not exceeding 30 work days, leave without pay because of personal illness (including maternity leave), leave without pay for school purposes, and active service in the armed forces of the United States will be counted as continuous service.

Breaks in service the total of which does not exceed 30 calendar days and one or more separations, each not exceeding one

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CAMPAIGN SHORT OF EXPECTATIONS

The Community Chest campaign at the Laboratory will close after November 30 and indications are that the drive will fall far short of the anticipated contributions unless a considerable increase in collections is noted in the next few days.

As of November 21, a total of \$5,638.07 had been contributed by 1,907 employees, representing 60 per cent of the staff. The average per contribution for the Laboratory was \$2.95, approximately eight cents lower than the final average during the 1948 drive.

Solicitors are requested to accept contributions through November 30. Solicitor's report sheets should be turned in to division chairmen immediately upon completion of solicitation in order that Community Chest headquarters may check records and disburse the money collected in accordance with the wishes of the contributors.

Community Chest headquarters will be maintained on the second floor of the Administration Building, telephone 2228, through December 2 and any employee wishing to make a contribution December 1 and 2 may contact this office.

Although no goal was set for the Laboratory, it was hoped that at least \$10,000 would be collected. It is still possible to collect this amount before the campaign is concluded and solicitors are requested to concentrate their efforts on attaining at least a 90 per cent participation and an average contribution of \$3 or more in each division.

Ten of the 18 divisions boasted an average per contribution of more than \$3. They include, in order of their standing, Staff Offices and Independent Units, Structures, Aircraft Loads, Stability, Physical Research, Hydrodynamics, Fiscal, Compressibility, Full Scale, and



HONOR RETIRING NACA EMPLOYEES

Fifty friends at the Laboratory attended a reception and buffet supper last Tuesday night in honor of Miss Ruth Scott and Miss Margaret M. Muller of Washington, D. C., pioneer staff members of the NACA. The affair was held in the Activities Building.

Miss Scott, the first woman employee of NACA, and Miss Muller both will retire next month after 32 years' service with NACA Headquarters in Washington. As a sentimental gesture they are visiting old friends at the three research laboratories they helped to create, passing a couple of days each at Langley Laboratory, Lewis Flight Propulsion Laboratory in Cleveland, and Ames Aeronautical Laboratory at Moffett Field, California.

Joining NACA as a stenographer, Miss Scott later held several financial posts, including that of disbursing agent. She is now finance officer of the NACA. Miss Muller is credited with building up the NACA's office of aeronautical intelligence, which proved of incalculable value to the Army Air Forces and the Navy during the past war. Records, indexes and library references kept by this department shed light on many critical problems. For many years Miss Muller also handled the distribution of NACA's technical reports and other publications.

Both women joined the government research agency during the manpower shortage of World War I.

"We can't give them too much credit," said Dr. H. J. E. Reid, director, who served as toast-master of the affair. "They served as wheelhorses of NACA during its formative years. Nobody can say how much their efforts contributed to winning the past war - but it was plenty."
