SENATE VOTES ANOTHER CIVIL SERVICE PAY RAISE

Maybe it's the Christmas spirit, or maybe they're just getting more on the ball, but the Senate on Tuesday passed a bill calling for an additional graduated pay raise for Civil Service employees. The new raise, providing the House strings along, allows for an approximate 11 percent increase over present rates.

The new legislation repeals the raise of July 1, 1945, and offers in its place a 36 percent raise on the first \$1200 of base pay, 18 percent from \$1200 to \$4600, and nine percent above \$4600 up to a limit of \$10,000. These are figured on the old base pay rates.
