EXPECT 40 GOLFERS TO ENTER TOURNEY

A field of approximately 40 golfers are expected to tee off Saturdey, June 7 when the NACA Annual Championship Golf Tournament gets underway at the Hampton Country Club. Players will be divided into groups of four and each player will be notified as to other members of his group. No definite starting time will be designated but the rounds will be played at a time convenient for all four members of the group. All groups are requested to tee off not later than 2 p.m. on Sunday, June 8, so that the trophy presentation may take place at the Club House at 6 p.m. following the second round.

A 36-hole, medal play, handicap tournament will be played with 18 holes scheduled for both Saturday and Sunday. Trophies will be awarded to the three winners in both the low gross and low net brackets. In addition to the six permanent trophies, a perpetual trophy will be presented to the low gross winner.

Golfers who have not turned in their three qualifying rounds and the four dollar entrance fee are requested to turn them in today to Louise Neal, Room 102, Service Building.

CAST EMPLOYEES IN "DEAR RUTH"

Laboratory officials announced this week that the locations for the 1947 X-ray survey of LMAL employees have definitely been selected and preparations are being made to handle at least 1,000 members of the Laboratory staff during the week of June 9 through 13.

East Area employees will be Xrayed in a room on the first floor of the Utility Building, directly west of the Dispensary. West Area employees will report to the Electrical Building.

The X-ray survey is a service to Laboratory employees which is offered through the cooperation of the Bureau of Industrial Hygiene of the State Department of Health and is given at no charge to the employee.

State X-ray technicians will be at the Laboratory throughout the week of June 9 through 13 and notice will be given by telephone to each section head at the time the employees in his section are to report. It is asked that when the telephone notification is received, all employees in the section desiring examination report as promptly as possible to the clinic room designated for the two areas.

It was pointed out by Laboratory officials that it is not compulsory on the part of employees to be X-rayed, but it is strongly recommended that each employee avail himself of the opportunity of obtaining this valuable service at no cost to himself.

OLD WEST GATE OPEN 4 TO 4:30
