Paul Salake, West Machine, was declared Meet Champion and received a Chronograph wrist watch for his overall meet performance. In addition, he won the Starr Truscott Memorial Trophy presented by the Peninsula Jaycees for the best "vdro contestant. In placing first

the Hydro gas event, Salake established a new Class "A" Open National record, one of the three new marks set during the day.

The meet, which was conducted on Langley Field through the cooperation of Col. Robert W. C. Wimsatt, Base Commander, and the Ninth Air Force, was the fifth annual affair put on by the model club.

LAB EMPLOYEE DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

MISSES "DITCHING" AND HE'S GLAD

Robert R. Gilruth, chief of PARD, who is back at the Laboratory after six weeks in Europe, barely missed an "opportunity" to be a first-hand observer of the "ditching" of a DC-4 in mid-Atlantic last week. To put it mildly, he's glad he missed.

Gilruth and his wife were amonethe 48 passengers and crew members of the four-engined airplane which was approximately five hours out of Shannon and six hours from Gander, New Foundland, when two of the plane's engines cut out at 7,000 feet. This happened early in the morning of October 3 and the crew immediately sent out an SOS and ordered all hands to don their life jackets in preparation for "ditching".

Among the passengers were Eleanor Parker, movie actress, and a few children. Gilruth said the possibilities of a successful "ditching", especially in the rough mi-Atlantic at night, did not appear too good. But providence rode with them, for after twelve minutes the two dead engines came to life again and the huge plane lumbered on to New Foundland and later to New York with its weak but happy human cargo. During the twelve minutes that the two engines were out, the plane dropped from 7,000 to 2,000 feet.

Gilruth spent a month in England on official business, after which he and Mrs. Gilruth went on a two week vacation touring Belgium, Switzerland, France, Scotland, and Ireland before returning to the United States.

LEE TO ADDRESS ENGINEERS' CLUB

A joint meeting of the Peninsula Engineers' Club and the State Section of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers will be held at the Newport News Apprentice School auditorium on Thursday, October 16 at 8 p.m. "Whet Is New In Science and Engineering" will be the subject of an address by Everett S. Lee, Engineer-in-Charge of the General Engineering Laboratory, General Electric Company. Approaching his subject from the viewpoint of measurements, he will illustrate their importance in research and in the development of new scientific methods and industrial techniques.

Lee is a graduate of the University of Illinois and holds an M.S. in electrical engineering from Union College, where he was an instructor in electrical engineering. He served as lieutenant in charge of machine-gunnery in the U.S. Army School of Military Aeronautics at the University of Illinois during the first World War. Since 1919 he has been associated with the General Electric Co., and in 1931 was appointed to the position he now holds.

Mel Gough, Chief of Flight Research and Senior Advisor to the Erainbusters; Marvin Forrest, representing the NACA Supervisor's Club; Causey Davis, 'Aviation Committee Chairman for the Jaycees; Ceorge Poythress, Erainbuster president; and Tom Hulcher, PARD, presented the principal awards.

Fritz Breisch, West Machine, won first place in the Hydro Rubber event and established a new National Open Class "D" Fuselage record. Don Ogren, Clarksburg, W. Va., joined the record breakers by setting a new National Junior Class "C" Stick record for rubber powered models.

Other first place winners were: F. W. Smith, Washington, D.C., in the Hand Launched Gas event, and Al Leftwich, Richmond, in the Hand Launched Rubber event. A number of Junior awards went to J. H. Pira, New York, and Bill Dove, Hampton.

Dick Everett, Contest Director, presented Special Awards for unusual performances; and John Worth, Publicity Chairman for the Brainbusters, acted as Master of Ceremonies during the banquet.

Preceding the meet, the first in a series of Annual Model Technicsl Conferences was held at the Chamberlin Hotel on Saturday. Cosponsored by the Academy of Model Aeronautics and the Brainbusters, the conference.stressed technical aspects of model aviation and featured leaders of the model world who presented papers on topics affecting the scientific advancement of the field.

During the afternoon session, Hewitt Phillips, Flight Research and prewar Indoor model champion, initiated official talks with a discussion of promising possibilities for the future improvement of model performance. He was followed by Dr. Walt Good, Applied Physics Laboratory of Johns Hopkins University and National Radio Control model champion, who revealed an original approach to the problem of comparing model efficiencies. Frank Zaic, New York model manufacturer, designer and head of the International Organization of Modelers, added to the discussion by describing his recent experiments with model design and stability problems.

Following a banquet session presided over by Conference Chairman Tom Hulcher, Johnny Campbell, Free Flight Tunnel, presented movies and addressed the group.
