POLITICAL ACTIVITY RESTRICTIONS NOTED

In response to a request from several readers, the following information has been compiled which shows the restrictions on political activity imposed by the Hatch Act and the Civil Service regulations:

In addition to the right to vote, employees may express political opinions privately; belong to political clubs; make voluntary contributions to political organizations; be spectators at political meetings; and petition Congress.

No employee, however, may use his official position to assist a politicel party; take active part in eny political club, committee, onvention, rally, or solicitation of funds; solicit votes or render other service in connection with an election; write for publication in favor of any political party, candidate, fection, or measure;

Civil Service Examiners has announced the opening of Civil Service Examinations for the following positions: Aircraft Welder, WB-10, \$2787; Heet Treating and Orifice Instellation Mechanic, WB-10, \$2787; Machinist, WB-10, \$2787; Model Finisher, WB-10, \$2787; Structural Metal Fabricator, WB-11, \$2932; and Welder, WB-8, \$2516.

Those who qualify in these examinations may be given a probational appointment leading to a permanent Civil Service status. Those employed under war service or temporary appointments in these positions, who desire to receive a probational appointment to their present positions, should apply. No written test will be given, but applicants will be rated on qualifications and experience.

1 WEEK REMAINS IN LEAGUE PLAY




