# LEAVE STATUS FOR CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS

Several inquiries have been made by Laboratory personnel as to the status of employees while absent from duty for the purpose of taking Civil Service examinations. Laboratory officials announced this week that employees with War Service or Temporary appointments will be charged leave when taking Civil Service examinations for a permanent appointment.

The NACA Personnel Manual provides that employees on leave of absence for the purpose of taking Civil Service exams for promotions, which will result in an increase in pay, will not be charged leave if the exams are taken at the request and in the interest of the NACA. However, formal applications for leave must be made in advance.

It will be the policy of the Laboratory to grant annual or leave without pay to employees taking examinations for permanent appointments.

#### ANOTHER MILESTONE

Monday, March 3, marks another important milestone in the NACA's contributions to the advancement of aeronautics. Stemming from nothing more than the dream of a handful of farseeing men of science, the NACA has grown in 32 years to become one of the world's most important forces in the development and continued improvement of aviation.

Although there will be no special celebration of the occasion, it is an appropriate time to reflect on the tremendous strides that have been made through years of war and peace, since President Wilson on March 3, 1915, signed the bill which created the NACA as an agency of the U. S. Government to "direct and control the scientific study of the problems of flight."

It is also an opportune moment for recalling to mind the words spoken recently by John F. Victory, Executive Secretary and first employee of the NACA, who charged that "....the heart of America's potential strength to preserve the peace of the world is through supremacy in the air. We do not know today how good our airplanes have to be to assure that supremacy. That means we must prepare against the unknown. It means that there can be no contentment in the NACA with any measure of progress made, so long as room for improvement remains."

magazine "Astounding Science Fiction" we ran across an article in which someone asked, "When a fly lands on the ceiling upside down, does he do a half loop to land or a half roll?" As yet we have been unable to determine just what tests the fly was put through or what tunnel worked on the project but the following answer was sent in by a flying instructor in Baltimore: "The question about the fly is one that was going the rounds of Pensacola when I was a Cadet there in 1942. Someone finally wrote to N.A.C.A. - National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics. The answer we got from that undisputed authority was that the fly in getting on the ceiling, neither half loops nor half rolls but flies up close, sticks his two front feet above his head, fastens them to the ceiling, and then momentum swings the fly's other four suction-cupped-feet in contact. There he is tight on the ceiling and definitely upside-down."

## AWARD WITHIN-GRADE SALARY ADVANCEMENTS

Laboratory officials announced this week that additional within-grade salary advancements will be awarded for superior accomplishment on the part of Laboratory employees. This announcement is made pursuant to the provisions of Public Law 106, 79th Congress, and regulations prescribed there under by the Civil Service Commission and provides that certain Federal employees who are compensated in accordance with the Classification Act of 1923, as amended, may have their basic rates of compensation increased one additional within-grade step. This provision does not apply to those employees who are compensated in accordance with Wage Board rates.

Supervisors recommending employees for such awards must submit documentary evidence of superior accomplishment, on the part of the employee, which meets one of the following standards as prescribed by the Civil Service Commission:

1. Sustained work performance for a period of at least three months of such a nature that it not only meets the requirements for the highest attainable efficiency rating but merits distinction among those whose current work performance is sufficiently outstanding to justify such rating.

2. Initiation of an idea, method or device, which has been developed and adopted because it is expected to improve the public service or provide for more economical operation in the public interest.

3. A special act or service in the public interest, related to official employment, over and above normal position requirements, of an unusual or distinctive character, where its recognition as a basis for an additional advancement would serve as a definite incentive to others.






#### STABILITY DIVISION LEAGUE
