U. OF VA. EXTENSION PLANS FUTURE WORK

After reviewing the results of two weeks of University of Virginia Extension work, Faculty Chairman Alfred Gessow is already making plans for the spring term.

A survey of Extension activities reveals that approximately 300 students have registered for 19 courses, the greater part of the registration being in mathematics and aeronautical engineering. It is of interest to examine the enrollment in each class inasmuch as it reflects the need of Langley employees for particular types of study and indicates the paths in which future training should be directed.

The courses being taught, number of students, and instructis are as follows: Advanced calculus, 12, Kenneth Margolis; Aerodynamics of Compressible Flows, 50, Morton Cooper; Elementary Spanish, 14, Guy Ferguson; Supersonics, 41, Dr. Antonio Ferri; Fundamentals of Aero. En-

(Continued from page 1) gineering, 20, Alfred Adler; Differential Calculus, 27, Tom Andrews; College Algebra, 10, John Houbolt; Electronics for Mech. Engineers, 14, Orville Harris; Math. Methods in Engineering, 20. Frank Diedrick; Applications & Predictions of Aerodynamics of Stability & Control, 12, Hewitt Phillips; Functions of a Complex Variable, 10, Bernard Budiansky; Differential Equations, 16, Charles Watkins; Physics, 9, Dr. Herbert Ribner; Electronics, 12, Fred Howell; Appreciations and Predictions of Flying Qualities, 12. Harold Crane; Aircraft Instrumentation, 8, David Newby; Strength of Materisls, 9, John Houbolt; and Partial Differential Equations. 9. Dr. Robert Coleman.

The large number of mathematical courses being given indicates the desire of engineers, computers, and techniciens for a broader mathemetical background and points out the need for a planned curriculum to setisfy this desire. For the next semester, Gessow intends to have a special curriculum in mathematics which will include courses rangine from College Algebra to higher specialized fields, such as Complex Variables, Vector Analysis, and Partial Differential Equations. The courses will be designed to avoid overlapping of subjects as far as possible and consideration will be given to setting up two courses of mathematical study, one designed for those whose work is mathematical in nature, and the other for engineers who wish to become familiar with the higher me theme tical tools in engineering. In addition, further study will be given towards establishing pre-requisites for some of the higher-level engineering courses and towards establishing a curriculum in Physics.

The work will be directed towards a more complete and rounded program leading to recognition in the form of advanced degrees. Students, instructors, and all interested personnel are urged to cooperate in this work and to offer suggestions as to organization, new courses, and teaching methods.

In connection with the work involved in organizing the courses for the present semester, Gessow wishes to commend John Ormand, Jr., Training Section, for his capable assistance in contributing to the success of the work.

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FROM AVIATION'S LOG BOOK

By Len Arnow Powered Box Kites----

The responsibility for the box kite type construction of early airplenes is said to belong to Lawrence Hargrave, an Austrailian. During the 19th century Hargrave developed the box kite on a scientific basis using curved lifting surfaces. He used one set of lifting surfaces on his later box kites for an adjustable tail in a similar manner to the airplanes which followed shortly thereafter.

Loggings----

An indication of the early lack of public interest in aviation in this country is shown by the figures for certified pilots in January 1911. France had 353 pilots, England 57, Germany 46, Italy 32, Belgium 27, and the U.S. A. 26. . . . The Wright brothers' first flight on December 17, 1903, was accomplished in the teeth of a 25 mile per hour gale. This slowed the ground speed of the airplane to but 10 miles an hour.

NACA Notes----

When the NACA was first established by Congress in 1915, its research program was set forth as follows: to improve airspeed meters for prevention of stall. development of more efficient wing sections, development of more efficient and economical aircraft engines, development of propellers, and the investigation of the stability problem among others. . . . In 1916, the Navy Department issued to the sircraft industry and the NACA specifications for the type of plane the Navy desired at the time. It was to have a speed range of 50 to 95 miles per hour with a full load consisting of one man and 22 hours fuel and oil. The wing span was to be 28 feet and a structural safety factor of 6 was to be used in the design.

Nothing New Under the Sun--The original Wright airplane featured a combined rudder and sileron control, thus preceding a trend in modern light plane design by over 40 years.
