322 ENROLLED IN U. OF VA.

The 1949 Fall Semester of the University of Virginia Graduate and Undergraduate School of Engineering opened last Tuesday night in the Hampton High School with a record enrollment of 322 students.

Of these students 280 are completing courses of study toward a Master's Degree in Aeronautical, Electrical, or Mechanical Engineering. The remaining students are taking undergraduate courses in Mathematics.

Classes in each course meet on Tuesday and Thursday nights each week from 7 to 9 p.m. The Fall semester is scheduled to rum for twelve weeks or twenty-four class meetings.

Upon satisfactory completion of the semester's work each student will receive three semester hours of credit with the exception of one four semester hour undergraduate course in mathematics.

will sponsor a model meet on Sunday, October 9 at 2 p.m. on the
Langley Air Force Base. The contest is being held to determine
the most consistant type of model
airplane. Rules for the contest
are as follows:

l. Any type model may be flown - gas, rubber, tow line glider, CO2, etc.

 Only one model of each type may be entered by the contestant.

3. There shall be no class distinction such as Class A, B, C, or D.

4. Each model shall be flown three times with no provision for delayed flights.

5. Maximum time per flight shall be two minutes and any time over that amount will be deducted from the maximum flight limit.

6. Entry fee will be fifty cents for one entry and twenty-five cents for each additional model entered.

7. The winner of the contest shall be the contestant whose total recorded three flights is the closest to six minutes.

8. First place award will be 50 percent of the entry money, second place 30 per cent and third place 20 percent.

9. Any contestant shall be eligible for more than one award.

10. Engine run for gas models shall be twenty seconds or less.

11. Weight and cross section rules will not apply to this contest.
