BLOODMOBILE

Through radio and newspaper publicity and various church, fraternal and business organizations most Laboratory personnel probably have learned of the Red Cross administered program to inaugurate a blood donor program in this area, and throughout the nation.

The fundamentals are briefly as follows: Blood is needed by the medical profession for the treatment of patients and for medical research. There is no sbustitute

for human blood.

In order that a supply of blood may be made available, the American Red Cross has undertaken the development of a national blood program whereby blood will be furnished to all those needing it without cost to the hospitals and physicians. The only cost to the patient will be the administration charge by the doctor and hospital.

Some four hundred regional blood centers are planned. The twenty-ninth of these has just been opened in Norfolk. From these center mobile units for which the name "Bloodmobile" has been coined, will tour the area collecting blood to be returned to the center for processing and distribution to the hospitals and physicians of the region.

Because of the large number of employees on duty at the Laboratory it has been decided that it would be expedient to have a Bloodmobile visit here periodically. Many employees have been or will no doubt be furnished with donor registration cards from other sources, but is believed that greater convenience for all will be accomplished if Laboratory employees are offered the opportunity of participating on the Base.

A competent staff of highly trained personnel, including physicians, staffs the Bloodmobile and a check is made of each prospective donor on the day of the visit to make sure that blood will

The first recipient of blood from this program in the Hampton area was Mrs. Peter P. Pavlik, wife of a Laboratory employee in the Technical Illustrating Section.


