35 TO TEE OFF IN GOLF TOURNEY

Thirty-five golfers will tee off Saturday when the NACA Annual Championship Golf Tournament gets underway at the Hampton Country Club. The 36-hole, medal play, handicap tourney will run for two days with the final round scheduled for Sunday. Following the final round, the trophies will be presented to the top three places in low gross and net brackets. In addition, a perpetual trophy will be awarded to the low gross winner. Trophy presentation is expected to take place at approximately 6 p.m. at the Hampton Country Club.

Players are grouped in threeomes and each player has been notiied as to the other two persons in his group. No definite starting time has been designated but each threesome will play at a time convenient for all three members of the group.

Last year's tournament was won by Jim Bertoci, 16-Foot Tunnel, with a 156 for the thirty-six holes. Second low gross was captured by George Griffith, Structures Research, with 164; and third place went to Dave Ochiltree, formerly of Structures now of the Washington Office. with 179. First low net was won by Billy Bates, Free Flight Tunnel, with 184 a 46 stroke handicap making his net strokes 138; second and third low net were won by Art Vogeley, Flight Research, and Frank Hart, Instrument Service. All of last year's winners, with the exception of Ochiltree, will be on hand Saturday to defend their titles.




