

COMPENSATION ACT AMENDMENTS CITED

The "Federal Employees' Compensation Act Amendments of 1949" was approved by Congress on October 14 and increases the maximum compensation for total disability from \$116.50 to \$525 per month, and the minimum is set at \$112.50, unless the employee's monthly pay is less, in which case he will receive the

full amount of his pay. Other pertinent amendments are as follows: Payment is provided for disfigurement, loss, or loss of use of a member or function of the body. This is based on a fixed number of weeks! compensation for accidents involving the loss, loss of use or function of specific parts of the body. The loss of a hand entitles the employee to 244 yeeks compensation; loss of hearing in one ear to 52 weeks compensation, etc. This compensation is in addition to payments for time lost from work or compensation paid for reduction in earning power as a result of the injury. This provision applies retroactively to injuries involving the total and permanent loss or loss of use of an arm, hand, leg, foot, or eye, or total and permanent loss of hearing in both ears to January 1, 1940 and in

year.

The basic compensation is increased 8 1/3 % while a disabled employee has one or more dependents. The compensation, therefore, would be 75% of the monthly salary rather than 66 2/3 %. This provision is limited to that portion of the monthly pay not in excess of \$120.

other cases retroactively for one

Previously in cases where an injured employee required the constant services of an attendant a \$50 monthly additional sum was allowed. This amount is increased to \$75.

BY PRESIDENT TRUMAN EXAMS OPENED

President Truman recently signed a bill approving the Unitary Plan. Under the new program the NACA, Navy, and Air Force will ask for an appropriation of \$252,000,000 for the construction of transonic and supersonic wind tunnel facilities for the solution of research, development, and evaluation problems in aeronautics, including the construction of facilities at educational institutions for training and research in aeronautics.

If the money is appropriated, \$136,000,000 will be used by the NACA to expand its facilities, \$10,000,000 will be used for smaller tunnels located at universities, \$6,000,000 for a wind tunnel at the David W. Taylor Model Basin, and \$100,000,000 for the Air Engineer-

ing Development Center.

The Unitary Plan is sponsored by the NACA and the National Military Establishment to meet the most pressing national needs. When the money is made available, the Committee will be authorized to construct and equip transonic and supersonic wind tunnels of a size. design and character adequate for efficient conduct of experimental work in support of long-range fundamental research at educational institutions to be selected by the Committee. The Committee will also be authorized to expand the facilities at its existing laboratories by the construction of additional supersonic wind tunnels. including buildings, equipment, and accessory construction. These facilities shall be operated and staffed by the Committee but shall be available primarily to industry for testing experimental models in connection with the development of aircraft and missiles. Such tests shall be scheduled and conducted in accordance with industry's requirements and allocation of laboratory time shall be made in accordance with the public interest.

Under the Unitary Plan, the Secretary of Navy would be authorized to expand the naval facilities at the David W. Taylor Model Basin, Carderock, Maryland, by the construction of a wind tunnel, and the Secretary of the Air Force would be authorized to establish an Air Engineering Development Center. The site for the center has not been selected but the center will be devoted to research, development, and evaluation studies in connection with all aspects of aircraft operation, guided missiles, and other components in super-

ministrator of the Federal Security may direct an injured employee to undertake vocational rehabilitation at the government's expense. In these cases, an additional \$50 may be awarded monthly for maintenance while undergoing such training.

Death benefits to dependents are increased as follows: To a widow, or wholly dependent widower (by reason of physical or mental disability) from 35% to 45%; to a widow or widow with children, 40% plus 15% for each child, the maximum allowable being increased from 66 2/3 to 75%; to dependent children, if there is no widow or widower, 25% to 35% for the first child, with an additional 10% for each child, the maximum being increased from 66 2/3 to 75%.

The amount allowable for funeral expenses is increased from

\$200 to \$400.
